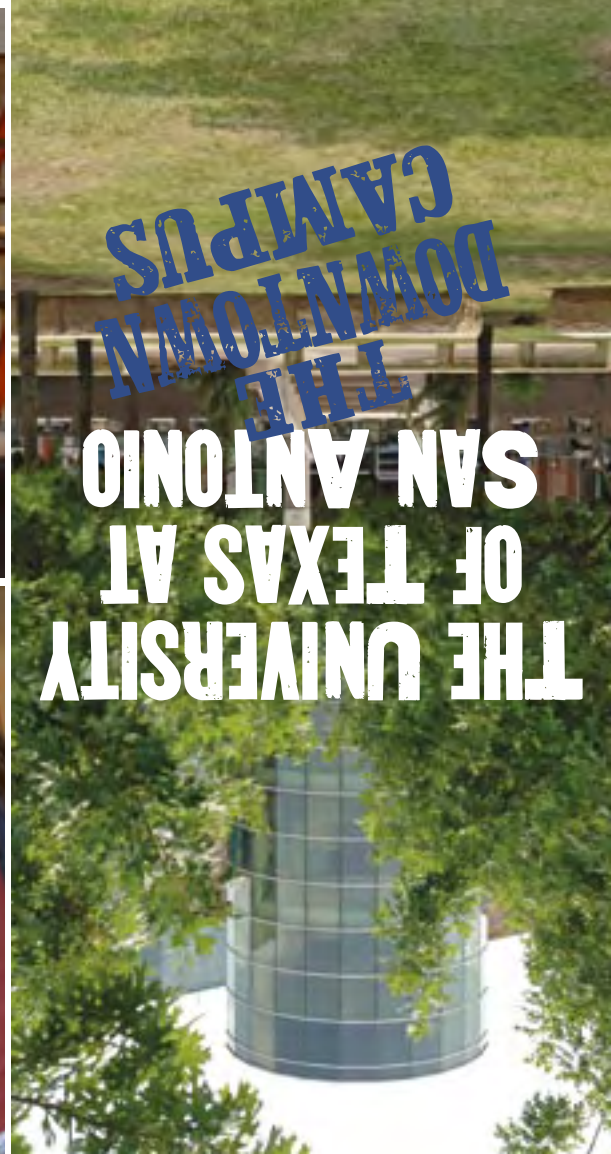


# WELCOME TO UTSA

WITH MORE THAN 120 DEGREE PROGRAMS AND A STUDENT POPULATION OF MORE THAN 27,000, THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS AT SAN ANTONIO IS ONE OF THE FASTEST-GROWING PUBLIC UNIVERSITIES IN TEXAS. FOUNDED IN 1969, IT IS THE SECOND-LARGEST INSTITUTION OF THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS SYSTEM. IN ITS BRIEF HISTORY, THE UNIVERSITY HAS GRADUATED MORE THAN 64,000 STUDENTS.

The university serves the higher education needs of San Antonio and South Texas through programs and services offered at its three campuses: the 1604 Campus, the Downtown Campus and the Institute of Texan Cultures.



### UTSA DOWNTOWN HISTORY

Although UTSA was founded in 1969, the Downtown Campus did not emerge until the mid-1990s. In 1993, Bill Miller Bar-B-Q Enterprises Inc. bought and donated the Fiesta Plaza site for the future home of the Downtown Campus, and UTSA received \$20 million from the State of Texas for construction. A year later, the first classes were held at Cypress Tower, a temporary location until the Downtown Campus opened in 1997.

The Downtown Campus has been referred to as a bridge spanning the present and future while linking the diverse neighborhoods of the downtown area. Located in historic Cattleman Square near Vista Verde, the campus connects the West Side with downtown San Antonio.

The Downtown Campus has grown rapidly to include three modern, state-of-the-art academic buildings, architecture classrooms and studios in the Monterey Building, and a parking garage. Student enrollment reached 909 during its first year of operation at Cypress Tower. Today the Downtown Campus serves more than 6,000 students. In 1994, the campus offered 51 courses. Today it offers nearly 500 courses.

### DOWNTOWN ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

The UTSA Downtown Campus offers 16 undergraduate and seven graduate degree programs that can be completed entirely on the campus.

The campus also offers courses in support of teacher certification at all levels as well as bilingual and English as a second language certification. Three undergraduate programs at the university are now offered exclusively at the Downtown Campus. These are architecture, interior design and criminal justice. Five graduate programs (architecture, counseling, justice policy, public administration and social work) also are offered exclusively at the Downtown Campus.

For the College of Architecture, the move to the Downtown Campus responds to the college's mission of equipping students to be effective practitioners by using an urban laboratory to facilitate a theoretical and practical study of San Antonio's historic setting. The downtown location maintains an even closer relationship with professionals

and brings greater opportunities for working with city agencies and various neighbors. Additionally, the three architecture degree programs take advantage of the unique culture in South Texas and the borderlands of the southwestern United States and northern Mexico.

The College of Public Policy also is housed at the Downtown Campus. In addition to the programs already listed, the college also offers a minor in nonprofit management. The College of Public Policy also started a graduate degree in social work in 2005. The Downtown Campus provides faculty and students in the college opportunities for more accessible interaction with the community and representatives from city, county and other public service institutions.

#### B.A.A.S.

UTSA now offers a Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences degree for all students who have graduated from a regionally accredited, two-year college with an associate degree in applied sciences. The new degree program offers a structure of coursework that will build on the initial two years of coursework to provide the baccalaureate degree.

### VISITING THE DOWNTOWN CAMPUS

The UTSA Downtown Campus Visitor Center, located in the Frio Street Building, offers individual or group tours. Tours are available at 2 p.m. Monday through Friday. Parking for visitors is available on the top level of the Downtown Campus parking garage. 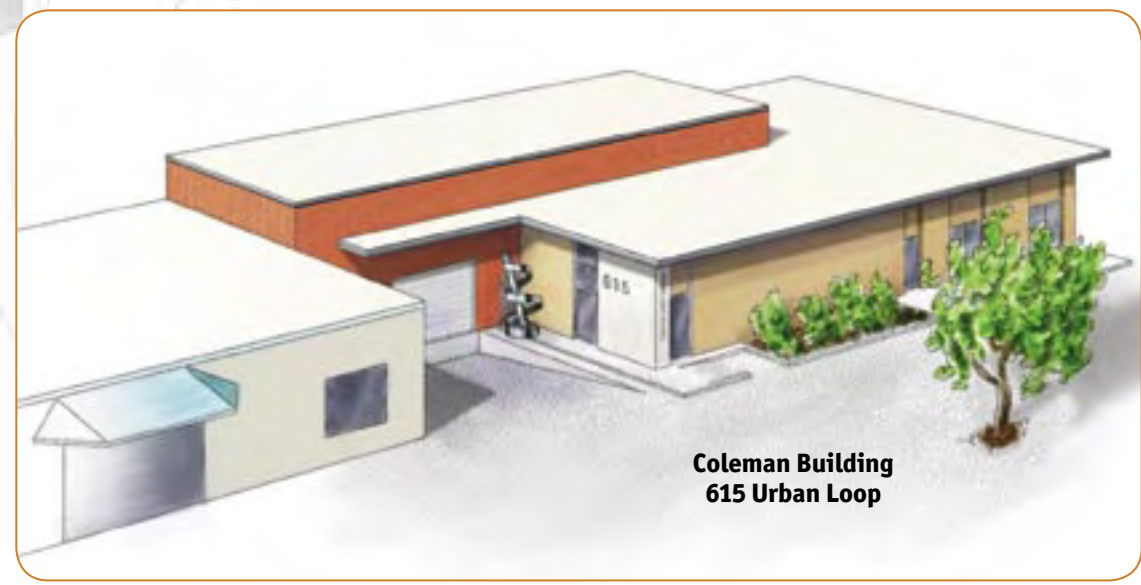
