A Tier One University

The University of Texas at San Antonio was established in 1969 as a “university of the first class” by the Texas Legislature. It has evolved from 670 graduate students in 1973 to more than 30,000 graduate and undergraduate students today.

In 2009, UTSA was recognized as one of the state’s emerging research universities, the first step in becoming Tier One in Texas. Tier One universities are known for outstanding research, quality education and generating major economic contributions to the region.

Economic Impact

A Tier One university means economic growth. UTSA already generates more than \$1.2 billion in annual business revenue and supports more than 15,700 jobs in the San Antonio area. Approximately 86 percent of UTSA graduates remain in Texas, adding an estimated \$4.8 billion in earnings alone to the state economy. Nearly 70 percent of alumni remain in the San Antonio metropolitan area.

UTSA’s Strategy for the Future

UTSA has created a 21st century vision for Tier One. UTSA will focus on research, academic excellence and an international reach. We are attracting top talent and partnering with local, regional and state organizations. Together we will drive growth in the knowledge based economy to build and sustain new industries, jobs and futures for all Texans.

TUITION and FEES

Historically, UTSA is less expensive than other Texas public universities in major metropolitan areas.

Undergraduate tuition and fees for the 2010–2011 academic year is \$7,892, based on 15 credit hours each semester for two semesters.

FINANCIAL AID

Nearly 70 percent of all UTSA students are eligible to receive financial aid, including grants, scholarships, loans and work-study jobs.

In the 2009–2010 academic year, UTSA assisted students with:

- \$15.5 million in scholarships
- \$71.9 million in grants
- \$2.6 million in work-study awards
- \$146.4 million in loans

UTSA has established the Undergraduate Tuition Support and Access (UTSAccess) program for incoming freshmen with annual family incomes of \$30,000 or less. Eligible students receive grants and scholarships to cover tuition and fees for four years as long as they take 24 hours a year and maintain at least a 2.0 grade point average.

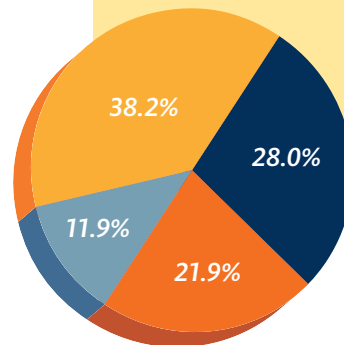

COLLEGES AT A GLANCE

The College of Architecture is the second-largest college or school of architecture in Texas. It has 20 full-time tenured and tenure-track faculty members and 25 adjunct faculty members who bring a wide range of experience and expertise to the classroom. Research funding has increased tenfold in the past three years, from more than \$21,000 in 2007 to nearly \$222,000 in 2010.

The College of Business is the largest undergraduate business school in the University of Texas System and is third nationally in graduating Hispanic undergraduates. The college's MBA program is ranked in the top 10 nationally by *BusinessWeek*, *Hispanic Business* and *Princeton Review*.

The College of Education and Human Development is a leader in innovative teaching practices, health professional development and binational/bicultural issues. The college has secured over \$14 million in external funding for scholarships, academic programs and research. It is the largest provider of educators in the San Antonio area, one of the largest in the state and has a 100 percent passing rate for teacher certification exams.

The College of Engineering is the fastest-growing college of engineering in Texas, doubling in size over the past seven years. It is in the top 10 nationwide for producing the most Hispanic engineers. Since 2000, annual research funding has increased by more than 700 percent. The UTSA Texas Sustainable Energy Research Institute is receiving a \$50 million investment from CPS Energy to explore alternative energy solutions.

The College of Liberal and Fine Arts is the largest college at UTSA, with over 6,600 students. The college offers 58 endowed scholarships, and ranks second in the UT System for external research funding in the arts, humanities and social sciences. In 2009-2010, the UTSA Debate Team finished the season ranked 10th in the nation, surpassing Harvard, Vanderbilt, Dartmouth, Baylor and UT Austin.

The College of Sciences serves more than 5,000 students in 12 bachelor's and 14 graduate programs. It is home to the world's most powerful electron microscope—the first of its kind in the United States—that displays images at a resolution of less than one ten-billionth of a meter.

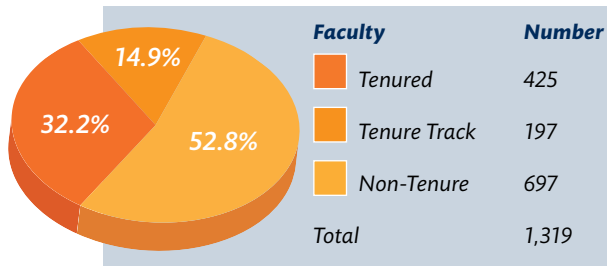
The College of Public Policy is headquartered at the Downtown Campus, within close proximity to more than 150 government, law enforcement and nonprofit organizations that partner with the college and offer internships to its students. It offers the American Humanics National Certification in Nonprofit Management and Leadership, one of only four programs in the state. In 2009-2010, the Department of Criminal Justice was awarded over \$500,000 in federal grants and contracts.

The Honors College offers academically talented students, in all majors, small classes and an intellectually challenging curriculum that prepares undergraduates for national scholarship and fellowship competitions. Approximately \$300,000 in scholarships are awarded annually to more than 120 students.



FACULTY and STAFF

UTSA prides itself on recruiting and retaining faculty members who are nationally and internationally recognized in their fields. The university added more than 25 tenured and tenure-track faculty positions over the past year. UTSA's endowed professorships, a measure of academic excellence, include 14 distinguished chairs and six distinguished professorships.



In fall 2010, UTSA employed 1,319 faculty and more than 2,700 staff who create and support UTSA's teaching, research and outreach missions.

Areas of Excellence In line with UTSA's Strategic Plan, five areas of research and academic excellence have been identified and targeted for growth.

- **Energy and the Environment** UTSA researchers are looking for ways to improve our existing energy systems and are developing new energy sources based on wind and solar power. UTSA faculty are utilizing nano-scale materials to improve the efficacy of solar power cells, while others are creating biofuels from algae.

- **Health** Fundamental advances in immunology, bioengineering and genetics are being facilitated by UTSA faculty to create new vaccines and novel biomedical devices to treat challenges to our health.

- **Human and Social Development**

Individuals seek friends, an education and social activities, and pursue musical and artistic expression to bring fulfillment to their lives. UTSA faculty members explore the process of interweaving these activities within our technologically-driven society.

- **Security** There is crime in our cities, attacks in the cyber-realm and the threat of terrorist attacks. What protective measures can we create with our technologies and through societal intervention to reduce these risks while protecting individual freedoms? UTSA faculty have embraced this challenge of our times.

- **Sustainability** Our population is in an economically intertwined world, and we all enjoy aspects of our technological society. Yet these dynamics have placed a tremendous burden on the natural pattern of life. UTSA faculty are working to create a sustainable future for all of us.

UTSA is an NCAA Division I school with a winning legacy of 40 NCAA championships since 1981. In 2010-2011, with the addition of football, Roadrunners will compete in 17 men's and women's sports, including:

UTSA Football fall 2011

In fall 2011, UTSA launches its inaugural football season. All 26 members of the program's first signing class earned all-district accolades, including 11 who were selected to all-area teams during their careers, and six who are academic all-state honorees.

Led by national championship Coach Larry Coker, the Roadrunners will play their home games in San Antonio's Alamodome, and the team will kick off for the first time against Northeastern (Okla.) State University on Sept. 3, 2011.

On Nov. 11, 2010, UTSA announced it has accepted an invitation to join the Western Athletic Conference (WAC). The Roadrunners officially become members of the WAC on July 1, 2012.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

UTSA strives to create an impact on San Antonio and South Texas through public service, extension, outreach and community education. UTSA provides leadership in economic development, lifelong learning, global extension and applied research.

Outreach Programs Economically, UTSA contributes to the community through its 17 Division I athletic programs, the Institute of Texan Cultures, Pre-freshman Engineering Program, purchases from Historically Underutilized Businesses and the Institute for Economic Development, in addition to other departments and programs such as the Office of P-20 and Extended Education.

Outreach Centers and Institutes UTSA's research-based institutes and centers target diverse areas and include the Center for Archaeological Research, the Institute for Cyber Security, the Institute for Demographic and Socioeconomic Research, and the UTSA Mexico Center. Such endeavors foster research, discovery and innovation for the university, San Antonio and beyond.

Doing Business with UTSA UTSA contributed \$131 million in total business output for the San Antonio area. UTSA spent more than \$55 million with local businesses. Of that amount, 29.8 percent or \$16.5 million in goods and services were purchased from Historically Underutilized Businesses (HUB). UTSA values businesses that support its vision of becoming a premier research university.

ALUMNI

UTSA alumni—81,000 strong—play a key role in building tradition and pride at UTSA. Thousands have continued their relationship with UTSA by joining the Alumni Association.

One goal of the UTSA Alumni Association is to support the educational mission of UTSA by raising funds for student scholarships.

To date, the Alumni Association's endowment has grown to more than \$1 million. The association has awarded more than \$850,000 in scholarships to UTSA students. If the goal of more than \$100,000 in scholarships is reached next year, it will be the highest amount given in one year in the association's history.

The Alumni Association encourages students to stay connected after graduation by attending happy hours or lectures, volunteering at graduation ceremonies or taking part in annual events such as the Diploma Dash 5K San Antonio City Championship Race and Fitness Walk.
